# Treasurer's End of Year Report

Our income for the year has decreased very slightly and there has been an increase in the cost of venues, postage and newsletter printing which has reduced our accumulated funds, but overall we still have a healthy balance. Both the open and championship show's incomes were very much the same as last year (figures shown in brackets) with just a small increase in cost of the Shenstone venue and the replenishment of the rosette stocks. The cost for hiring the Nether Whitacre venue for committee meetings and shows has remained the same which has been very helpful.

As many of you will be aware it is now possible to buy items and services on-line using Paypal and over the year we have seen an increase in its use. We would encourage a greater use of this facility, particularly from our overseas members, which eliminates the banking of cheques which is particularly time consuming. Any residue from the flat rate handling fee of 50 pence will be donated to Club funds.

We very much appreciate the continued support and financial generosity of our membership.

## Rescue Funds

Our Rescue Fund income has decreased by a small amount but the overall balance has increased slightly due to the fact that there has been very little expenditure in 2013. There is also some donation money to be transferred into this account. Again we very much thank our membership for their continuing generous donations.

## ANNUAL HEALTH REPORT 2014

The last year, 2013, seems to have been quite busy on the health front although, as always, the overall picture is of a breed which is fundamentally healthy and robust.

EPILEPSY The Finnish study is continuing and I am gratified that more samples have been submitted from U.K. dogs. A swabbing session was held at the Club Ch show in October and while take-up was poor on the day, several breeders submitted swabs later.

The study, by the University of Helsinki, has identified a chromosomal region which harbours variations likely to be associated with an increased risk of epilepsy in the breed. Laboratory experiments are currently underway to analyse this region in more detail. There is evidence that the same chromosomal region is linked to an increased risk of epilepsy in another breed as well, so steady progress in understanding this disease is being made. To date, I have become aware of only a small number of dogs actually diagnosed with epilepsy in this country.

BREED HEALTH SURVEY As I write, a second breed health survey has recently been launched on the Club web-site. Response is poor so far but any ultimate findings will be available later in 2014.

RESCUE A considerable amount of work went in to drafting standard documentation for the collection of information, including health data, on all dogs entering Rescue. This has now been completed and approved and the forms are now in use.

GENETIC DIVERSITY This topic remains on the Health Committee's agenda and has featured at the Kennel Club's Health Co-ordinator's symposia which I have attended for the last few years. At the moment, the committee is simply monitoring the situation but consideration will be given later in the year to staging an educational event for breeders.

MPSIIIIB At the club's request, the K.C. has now recognised the test offered by the University of Pennsylvania and testing of stock is now a requirement for Schipperke breeders applying to join the Assured Breeders Scheme. It is also called for by the Club's Code of Ethics.

Open test result registers have been established on the Club web-site, a section for dogs tested clear, one for carriers and one for dogs "clear by descent". Recent information from the Health Committee of the Schipperke Club of America indicates that the incidence of MPSIIIIB has dropped dramatically in the US in the last few years, due to the regular use of testing. Many breeders have now eliminated the condition from their lines altogether and no longer even need to use carriers in their breeding programme. It is to be hoped that we can achieve this even more quickly in the UK where the disease was much less established.

I have been in correspondence direct with Dr Giger, the Director of the test facility in Pennsylvania and I am assured that his data should be published for peer review very soon.

KARLTON INDEX This is an independent mechanism, run in conjunction with the K.C., which seeks to evaluate the efforts made by breed clubs to address health concerns in their breed. It has now been in operation for several years and uses a scoring system, which, when last published, showed the Schipperke Club had been awarded an additional 5 points, taking our score to 22. With very many breeds still in single figures, it is gratifying to receive external recognition of the Club's efforts in this way.

I thought this was an unfortunate name until I was told it was Hungarian for "Small Black Thing". Again Bundi found himself at the age of three years needing a new home because his owner had died. This little boy lived in Perth and Ian Miller was ready to help collect him. Whilst trying to organise this, a local vet contacted one of his retired nurses who already had two Schipps and she took him in. I am pleased to report he is happy in his new home.

### PIPPA

This elderly lady is fifteen years old and currently lives with her owner in her eighty's. I was asked by her daughter who lives in Switzerland if I could help should her mom go into hospital. I agreed to be a standby to look after Pippa temporarily or permanently.

### BEN

Ten years ago I received a call from a vet who had refused to euthanase Ben. He had known him since he was a puppy and was then a happy healthy thirteen year old. He lived a further ten years and sadly passed away in November 2013. This made him a staggering twenty-three years old. The only problem he had developed was diabetes during the last five years of his life. He required insulin injections daily and a sensible diet. His eyesight was failing and he had stiff joints but I was told he still enjoyed his daily walk right up to the day before he peacefully passed away.

As there were no dogs in Rescue this year I have managed to help some of you re-home dogs. Please continue to let me know if there are any Schipps needing a home so I can pass your details onto people when they phone me.

First of all I would like to thank everyone for the wonderful entry, many of the dogs missed out on a first prize.

One thing that did bother me however was dirty teeth & long nails. The dog needs to be presented as a whole. Apart from that I was pleased with my winners.

The other thing that I think (& I hope the audience agreed with me) was the 'oldies', they could still 'strut' their stuff & show some of the others what it is all about!! But that should be what a true Schip should be like.

1 Butters Roopec Admire Me, 10 month old gold dog with a good head, dark eye & correct ears which he used all the time, nice front & topline, good coat & a well set tail, movement was a bit erratic but handler said that was her fault, correct training will help.

1 Whales Aradet Zeus at Roshaana, lovely foxy head with a dark oval eye, ears of correct length & carried well, a good body with well placed shoulders, high set tail which he used most of the time, unfortunately just lacking a bit of coat but that did not detract from his overall appearance, movement was sound.

2 Donaldson's Aradet Zulu, brother to winner & very similar, slightly smaller in size & better coated, however I preferred the movement of 1.

### Special Yearling Dog (0)

#### Post Graduate Dog (3)

1 Fludder's Aradet Xtra Addition, nice cobby dog with a lovely head, dark eye & good neat ears which he used non-stop, neck was set on a correct pair of shoulders, nice short back, with an very good coat of the correct texture, he moved with drive fore & aft.

2 Manners Roopec Diamond Black, slightly longer cast than 1, but still a nice dog, his head is broader so he carries his ears not quite erect, good dark oval eye, nice length of neck & a well placed shoulder, coat is carried close to the body, he has just the right amount of bone, movement was good also.

3 Muggleton's Mywulf Flame Of Arnor, cream dog who decided the day wasn't his, longer cast than 1, good head, dark eye & pigmentation, but would not use his ears, good body & coat, movement slightly erratic.

#### Limit Dog (2)

1 Muggleton's Aradet Wizard Of Oz Amongst Mywulf, I liked this boy as a puppy & now at 3½ he is coming into his own, he doesn't strike you straight away but he is so honest I couldn't overlook him, gold boy with a strong head & very well used ears, excellent dark eye & pigmentation, neck strong & slightly arched & set on very good shoulders, legs set under the body, carried good bone, nice short back with very good coat of the right texture & demarcation, tail well curled & carried over the body, moved up & down the mat as if he owned the place, suddenly pulled out all the stops in the challenge to win, CC & BIS.

2 Philpott's Aradet Expert Timing, Another nice dog, with a lovely head, small neat ears, dark eye & in good coat, just slightly longer than 1 so not as cobby, moved well & very well schooled.

### Open Dog (5)

1 Holmes Schipdale Dickens for Dencas JW, nice dog & well presented, good head but lacking ruff, nice dark eye, ears set well on head, good bodied dog but just lacked a bit of coat, nice tight curl in his tail, moved very well up & down the mat. In the challenge he seemed to say enough is enough & didn't show as well as in the class.

2 Fellows Avidore History Maker at Blackshuck, another nice dog, similar in height to 1, but carried a bit more body, excellent head, ear set & dark eye, good cobby body with plenty of coat, moved & showed well.

3 Fludders Aradet Shot In The Dark, smaller dog than the other two but short & cobby, excellent coat with the correct texture, good head & ear set, eye could be a little darker, didn't move as well as I have seen him in the past but never stopped showing.

### Veteran Dog (under 10yrs) (3)

1 Wilson's Ch. Aradet Off The Chart At Lyncathmor, 9 year old in beautiful condition, slightly taller than I would have preferred but a very likeable dog, super head with dark eyes & ears well set, good strong neck, lovely cobby body with an excellent coat of the right texture & demarcation, nice level top-line standing & on the move, which was true fore & aft, considered him for the CC but his son beat him to it. RCC, RBIS, BVIS.

2 Manners Komargo's Crazy Diamond At Roopec, 7½ years old, nice boy with a good cobby body & a close jacket, good head, dark eye, ears set a little wide apart, moved just a little close behind but front movement was good.

3 Donaldson's Carozza To Hot To Handle, 7 years old, nice short compact body with a very good coat, nice head, ear set & dark eye, didn't move as well as I have seen him in the past.

### Veteran Dog (over 10yrs) (1)

1 Muggleton's Mywulf Faramir's Dream, 11 years old & looking his age but still had it in him to show, nice head, ear set & dark eye, good textured coat, movement was a 'bit wobbly', but what else can you expect with the 'oldies', nice dog.

### Junior Handler (6-11yrs) (3)

1 Leah Scales 10 years old, this young lady listened to everything I asked of her, always talked to her dog & had him placed right, always aware of everything in the ring, she did enough to win the class & BJH.

2 Millie May Hart 6 years old, she just managed to see over the table but still put her own dog on to it, she moved & showed her dog very well & I think we now have another junior to take over the reins later on.

3 Sarah Hawkins 9 year old young lady, who I think was not quite used to showing, but she still had her dog on the table & managed to walk & show it by herself.

### Junior Handler(12-16yrs) (1)

1 Michaela Donaldson 13 years old & very experienced handler, however she did not listen to one instruction which cost her the best jh. Congratulations to all the JH's.

1 Manners Roopec Birthday Treasure, 10 months old, I have in my notes lovely puppies, there was not much difference between 1 & 2 except I preferred the darker eye of the winner, both had lovely heads, ears were well set & well used, they both had good reach of necks & a straight top-line on the move & standing, both were well coated & they moved & showed ever so well for their handlers, difficult choice between them, BPIS.

2 Bugg's Byquy Black Carat.

### Junior Bitch (3)

1 Fegan's Wagaman Black Magic, this young lady did not seem as outgoing as I have seen her in the past, although saying that she still moved very well, she has a lovely coat well textured, good straight back on the move & standing, small cat-like feet, legs well under the body, good neck with a beautiful feminine face, dark eye & well placed ears, when she used them, her time will come.

2 Massey's Carozza Black Lace At Ristine, unlucky to meet 1, another really nice bitch, really lovely sweet head, well placed ears, dark eye, good body & moved really well, just preferred overall look on 1.

3 Reid's Catchwell Rapture, another nice bitch with all the good qualities, unfortunately just entering that junior stage where her coat is neither here nor there, all these 3 bitches could swap places in the near future.

### Special Yearling Bitch (2)

1 Hardy's Byquy Thyme At Palmosa, my notes say a nicely made bitch but refused to use her ears, apart from that she moved well & had a good coat on her, nice head with a good dark eye & sweet expression, good body & tail set. 2 West's Bahram Rosetta, another nice bitch, good head & dark eye, ears were a little large, good cobby body, with a nice coat, moved & showed well.

### Post Graduate Bitch (4)

1 Massey's Scipsar Alice In Wonderland At Ristine, good head & eye, ears well placed just a tad too big, good body & coat, just a little on the soft side, movement was ok, but showed very well.

2 Leaf's Chadbower Bonnie Rye, nice gold bitch, just a bit leggy but has a very good head & expression, dark eye & pigmentation, carried ears well, coat close to body, moved & showed well.

3 Muggleton's Mywulf Dark Dragoness, another good bitch, perhaps unlucky to meet the other two & wasn't showing her best today, has a sweet head, eye & ear set, in good coat & moved well.

### Limit Bitch (3)

1 Hart & Hawkins Carozza Last Orders, feminine head with a nice dark eye, ears set & used well, good body with a close fitting jacket, tail well curled over back, nice tight feet, moved well, just in the challenge she dropped her top-line.

2 Manners Scipsar Black Magic At Roopec, nice head with a good ear set, good dark eye, slightly longer in body than 1, coat is of correct texture, movement was a little close behind.

3 Wearing's Aradet Xotic Dancer, smaller bitch than the other two, has a nice head & neat ears, good dark eyes, cobby body, but her movement let her down.

### Open Bitch (4)

1 Forknall's Avidore Hot Gossip, a very nice bitch to go over, feminine head with a dark eye, well placed ears, good reach of neck, cobby body with plenty of coat of the right texture, good curled tail over her back, nice tight feet, overall appearance was very pleasing, she moved & showed really well. RCC. 2 West's Ch & Am Ch Shalako's The Last Rose At Bahram, another nice bitch, good head & ear set which she used all the time, eye was just a little round for me, good cobby body covered by plenty of coat, moved well round the ring, in lovely condition.

3 Donaldson's Ch Carozza Athena, smaller bitch than the others but still one with quality, has a good head with a sweet expression, ears carried well, nice dark eye, good cobby body, in good coat but move slightly close behind today, showed well.

#### Any Other Colour Open Bitch (3)

1 Peck's Byquy Lilley The Pink, first of all I will say yes this young lady could have had more coat but she didn't hide a thing, a very sweet foxy head, good dark eye & pigmentation, ears on top which she used all the time, enough neck on good shoulders, lovely cobby body with a short straight back, tail curled tightly over the back, small cat-like feet, moved true fore & aft, never stopped showing, a lovely bitch. CC. In the challenge for BIS it was only her lack of coat which let her down.

2 Reid's Roshana Jocasta, another nice bitch with plenty of good qualities, nice sweet head & expression, dark eye & pigmentation, ears well set, nice cobby body, in-between coats at the moment, moved & showed really well.

3 Leaf's Chadbower Bonnie Rye.

#### Veteran Bitch (under 10yrs) (5)

1 Whales Ch Qwontox Quidnunc By Roshana, 7½ year old, have known this bitch since she was a pup & still a favourite, she goes round the ring as if she owns it & never stops showing, she has a lovely cobby body with a close fitting jacket, small tight feet, nice rounded rump, head set on a good shoulder, small neat ears, her eye could be a little bit more oval but they are dark, moved well.

2 Wearing's Aradet Party Politics, 8 year old, similar in type to 1, with a feminine expression, small neat ears & dark eye, nice cobby body with a good coat, she didn't move as well but never stopped showing.

3 Hart & Hawkins Ch Carozza Molly Malone, nearly 8 years old, good head, with a neat ear set, dark eye, body was slightly longer than other two, but carried a good coat & had neat feet, she moved & showed well.

#### Veteran Bitch (over 10yrs) (5)

1 Wilson's Ch Avidore Diamond Lil, 13 years old but forgot to act it, she never once stopped showing & just literally flew round the ring, she certainly put some of the youngsters to shame, a small bitch & could have carried a bit more coat but was in lovely condition, she has the sweetest of expressions, small neat ears & a good dark eye, well rounded rump & neat cat-like feet, she moved very well for a bitch her age.

2 Muggleton's Rexford Drama Queen At Mywulf, at just over 13 years she was the oldest in the show, although slightly longer in back than 1, she still has a good shape to her body, sweet head, ear set & dark eye, nice coat, well rounded rump, neat feet & moved & showed well.

3 Hart's Ch Ludwyn's Black Velvet, 10 years old, another 'old favourite', have liked her in the past but today she seemed a little off, she has a very feminine head with small neat ears, nice dark eye, good neck, nice body with plenty of coat, well rounded rump, she moved well but didn't show her best.

Thank you to the Club for giving me the opportunity to get hands on an appreciable number of dogs and to the exhibitors for supporting the classes (22 entered with 16 present) . This is such a good initiative and I believe it was this Club that first approached the KC with the idea of these special classes to give C list judges further experience, and which is now being supported by other breed clubs.

The bacon butty was part of a warm welcoming start to the day. Clearly it is a fact of life that not everyone will get on all of the time, and dog showing is certainly no exception to this. So it says so much for this charming breed that its' guardians have such good temperaments as to all sit down for lunch together in such a relaxed atmosphere for a championship show!

### Class A Special Yearling D/B (9,2a)

1. Bugg's Byquy Black Carat . Only 11 months so up against much older ones in this class but held her ground to win. She catches the eye, offering a compact package with everything to like. Lives up to the lively alert characteristics for the breed with a twinkle in her dark eyes. Exuding confidence, she moves at a brisk pace, straight and true.
2. Manners' Roopec Birthday Treasure. Another pup with a typical outline and shape and straight forelegs. Holds an excellent topline at all times with tail set and held correctly. Has the desired foxy expression on her feminine head.
3. Fegan's Wagaman Black Magic. 16.5 months, erect ears well set. Well bodied with ex depth of chest, well ribbed with short loins. Not the best performance on the move being somewhat erratic, but when she settles into her stride she shows she can do it.

### Class B Special Limit D/B (7,2a)

1. Fludder's Aradet Xtra Addition. 2.5 year old. Every time he stops he stands himself naturally so perfectly. Blackest of harsh coats with thick ruff. Strength in hocks and up on his toes. Looks the complete picture of balance both standing and when he moves, with cobby body and good tuck-up. His movement is where he excels.
2. Phillpotts' Aradet Expert Timing. Interesting for me to see that the first two are litter mates. Expressive eyes, strength in his neck, ex body, topline and ribs. Impressed by his fabulous hard muscle tone. Ex coat texture. Just piped at the post by his litter brother on this occasion.
3. Muggleton's Aradet Wizard of Oz Amongst Mywulf. 3.5 years old. Quality cream so well bodied and bone in proportion. Mature coat. Good angulation front and rear. Whereas I realise that non-blacks may not have black pigmentation, the standard still calls for this, so I must look for it. Mucked about on the move - saw just enough when settled to earn this place but could so easily have thrown it away. Pleased to see he was more settled later on when the Championship show judge awarded him BIS.

### Class C Special Open D/B (6,2a)

1. Donaldson's Carozza To Hot To Handle. 7 year old who was probably the furthest travelled for today. Had the very tightest of elbows and the best front assembly of the day which shows in his excellent reach (I found many short in upper arm and lacking in shoulder angulation). Secured his first place on his excellent front assembly. To be critical maybe he could have one less edible treat a day!
2. Fluddder's 6 year old Aradet Shot In The Dark. Of excellent type he moves true and parallel. Loved his head proportions and masculinity. Lacked a bit in attention until the titbits came out. Ex harsh coat texture.
3. Robjohns' Quontox Quincy ShCM. 3 year old. Not in best jacket today this lad has just the right amount of body on him. Truly alert and attentive to his handler he wouldn't miss a thing. Drops his tail on the stand at times (allowed) but always carries it up on the move when he goes so straight and true.

Some general observations, on the whole temperaments were good, overall construction was satisfactory but attention needed to upright shoulders which appear to be creeping into the breed, heads also need considering some bordering on being course, a 'sharp foxy expression' the breed standard calls – and the bites never had I even considered the schipperke to be a breed that suffers from bite problems however may were evident today please be aware of what is correct for this breed and do not allow this to pervade

1<sup>st</sup> Mance Schipdale Byron, 2yr old cream who caught my eye for type beautiful abundant coat, loved the sharp foxy expression and beautifully appointed head, short cobby boy with good movement I would have taken him home

3<sup>rd</sup> Manners Roopec Diamond Black stronger head piece nice expression overall nice body shape gave good outline correct bite

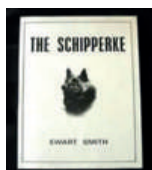

We lost Rupert just before Christmas at the age of 17 years. When we first had him he was known to some at the Schipperke Club as Battersea Rupert. He was even known out in Sidney, Australia where our daughter met a schipperke owner and told her about her Mum and Dad's Schipperke's history and she was asked "is that Battersea Rupert?" which surprised my daughter as she hadn't said his name.

Rupert Dec.1996 – Dec 2013

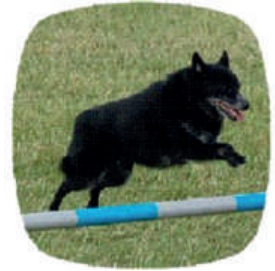
In April 1997 a friend working at Battersea introduced us to Rupert a Schipperke of 41/2 months with attitude hoping we would have him and be able to turn him around.

We fell in love with this little fellow and took him home. He was a challenge, quite naughty and guarded everything he was very clever and had plenty of character. His guarding was a problem most of his life. Caging was not good as he loved being caged and he guarded it with his life, getting him out was the biggest problem you could have. He was always caged in the car and was ok most of the time, but if he didn't want to get out you certainly knew about it.

His obedience was very good he got his KC Good Citizens award at a Country show (before the Bronze, Silver and Gold came in) in the first couple of years that we had him.

He was terrified of bangs and would run blindly for miles, something we were very aware of at all times.

His agility was a slow progress, although he loved his training when it came to shows half a course was enough, he learned that if he had a poo in the ring, that was an achievement and he would be taken out of the ring. He liked to play up at shows, a great entertainer hanging off Doug's leg or nipping him when he knew Doug was going wrong which was met with laughter from some and horror from other standing outside the ring.



He was 6 years old before he started winning agility classes, he moved up a couple of grades in the first two shows of the year when Doug had almost given up with him. He never looked back after that and was forced to give up agility at the age of thirteen years old as his sight was letting him down. There were very few Schipperke's competing in agility in those days, we only knew of one other in the South East which was Janice Philpott's Ben. Ben and Rupert ran in a pairs competition together at one show. They both played up but it was

lovely to see two Schipperke's in the same ring. We did hope for Schipperke glory but it wasn't to be.

We joined the Schipperke Club soon after getting Rupert and later after getting another Schipperke we worked on the Schipperke stand at Crufts and Earls Court with Rupert and our other Schipperke Paddy. Rupert was very good at meeting the public and particularly good with young children.

He also took part in the Battersea agility display team at Crufts for five years. Going into the ring holding his head up proudly and showing everyone that Schipperke's can do agility! He made us very proud of him.

This is in response to an article in the 2013 Autumn Newsletter edition:-

## DEALING WITH A DIFFICULT SCHIPPERKE

I've never put "pen to paper" in the olden days or fingers to keyboard to respond to an article in the newsletter but I was very troubled and distressed to read the article on Dealing with a Difficult Schipperke by Lyn Brown. The main causes of my concerns in the article are below: Now, I don't think I know this lady or whether or not she is a professional or trainer (which I have been for over 30 years and run Good Citizen Scheme classes three nights a week).

Anyway, first thing I would like to raise is the instruction to "pinch his toes with your feet or tap his nose and say loudly "off". What is this person about? To instruct owners to hurt their dogs in this way! Pinching and hitting belong to the bear baiting age! We have moved on. The Alpha in a pack is the one who leads the pack to food, is the protector – not the one who hits! A sure way to break the bond between you and your dog and to make the dog more aggressive and fearful!

To teach Leave It, place something on the floor that the dog is not allowed to have EVER (such as his toys, treats, food) and then walk him past it on the lead saying, Leave It as the dog approaches. This command then works for looking at dogs, cats, dropped food etc.

Now to the piece in the article that has really caused me great concern for the safety of the dog. Door or Gate Boundaries! So, with the door ajar as the dog rushes through SLAM THE DOOR IN THE DOG'S FACE!!!! So, what if your timing is out? The dog gets hit in the head, shoulder, body, tail etc by a slamming door? The injuries could be horrendous with broken bones at least. We don't want our dogs to be afraid of the door – we want our dogs trained with a strong "wait" command so that they don't attempt to go through. The article mentions so many times the owner being the Alpha – it is then our job to ensure the safety of our dogs. Don't let them get to a door leading to outside unless with us on a lead. If you really want to make a dog fearful – don't have it fearful of the door but of outside the front door on his own – this can be done by using a bottle with stones in it and as soon as the dog begins to go towards an open door someone outside bangs the bottle on the ground to make a loud sound with the command "Wait, get back". Do all the training on a lead until the dog is very experienced. Never risk someone being able to catch a dog as it's doing a runner outside – it's the way to disaster.

I see that another article is due next month and Lyn, please don't be offended but my concern has to always be with the safety and well being of the dogs.

### AGGRESSION TOWARD OTHER DOGS ON LEASH

(What you need for this exercise: Leash, choke chain, treats, squirt bottle)

The squirt bottle is one of the most effective tools in stopping undesired behaviour by “remote” means (which means without the effect being directly caused by you, from the dog’s point of view).

The object of this exercise is to distract your dog from aggressive behaviour toward other, strange dogs on leash, which are approaching you. The most common reason a dog displays this behaviour is protectiveness toward the owner/his territory. By distracting him by giving him another command, and praising him for the good behaviour (obeying the command) instead of merely correcting him for the bad one, you can prevent him from exhibiting the behaviour in the first place. Eventually, he will learn to look to you when a stranger approaches, instead of anticipating a command and praise, instead of automatically being aggressive.

This is a very common behaviour, and the more the dog is allowed to get away with it, the more the dog begins to feel that it’s his “job” to “protect” what’s his. A majority of dogs may be aggressive while on a lead with their owner, because they see the radius of the leash/owner as being their “property”. It’s always best, when introducing new dogs to each other, to do it in a large, neutral territory, fenced area, where they can meet on their own terms, without having to feel they have to protect anyone or anything.

### CONTROLLING AGGRESSION ON LEASH – here’s what to do...

If you’re walking your dog on a leash, and someone approaches you with another dog, anticipate that your dog is going to act aggressively toward the other dog if you know this is the normal pattern. First, look to make sure that the other dog owner has their dog on a leash, under control. If they don’t have their dog under control, tell them to do so. It’s unfair to your dog to have a strange dog bound up to you and invade his territory. As they approach you, get your dog’s attention, either with a treat, a toy or just your voice, whichever works best for you, and do an about turn and place your dog in a sit-stay at your side. Speak to your dog to keep his attention on you as the other dog approaches and passes; give him a treat and praise as the other dog passes, as long as your dog doesn’t show aggressive behaviour. The object is to keep his attention on you, not on the other dog.

### CONTROLLING AGGRESSION ON LEASH (continued)

As they pass, do another about turn/sit-stay so that your dog and you are facing in the opposite direction of the strange dog. Praise your dog profusely if he doesn’t make an aggressive move toward the other dog. If he does make a move, give him a squirt/correction, say “BAD DOG” or whatever you use as a correction command, distract him by turning him again, place him again on a sit stay and praise him when he obeys the command.

### LEASH PULLING

The above is also the same method you can use for leash pulling when going on walks. I suggest that you use different “tools” for recreational walks and “working” excursions, so the dog knows when he’s expected to heel and when he can have a little more freedom. A choke chain and six



foot lead works well for the controlled walks, a harness and a flexi-lead helps to dog to know he can roam a little more. By simply doing a series of about turns with your dog using short quick corrections to keep his attention on you when he doesn't follow, will keep him walking right at your side.

#### AGGRESSION WHEN FAMILY PLAYING IS GOING ON

It is a dog's natural instinct to protect family members when he fears someone is threatening their well-being. While it is a natural instinct for the animal, he needs to know that he is not an equal pack member, and it is always unacceptable behaviour for him to be aggressive toward his "superiors", in this case any human in his pack. If your dog continually exhibits aggression when family rough housing is going on, please see above exercise on "control" and apply them accordingly. If the behaviour continues I suggest you use the "roll" method as taught in the Monks of New Skete books, as it is very effective tool for this type of situation. When in doubt, if you know there is going to be wrestling going on, and you know it will stress your dog, simply remove the dog from the situation, by placing him in his crate or another area removed from the action.

#### THE COME GAME

The object of this game is to teach your dog to come, unfailingly, every time he's called. The most important thing to remember in this exercise is BE CONSISTENT! The idea is to brain wash your dog into coming to you quickly, every time he hears the word "COME!"

It is best in the beginning, to do this exercise inside your house. Once he gets the hang of it, you can move the exercise to the outdoors, inside a fenced enclosure. I don't recommend ever letting your Schip off leash in an unfenced area, but if you teach this command correctly, in an emergency, when your dog has escaped, he should come back to you unfailingly, without stopping to give it a second thought.

Start with your dog sitting directly in front of you, facing each other, with your toes just about touching. Get his attention with a favourite treat, and say "SPOT, COME!!!!" in a very excited voice. Immediately, give your dog the treat. Repeat this about ten times, until you have the dog's rapt attention, giving him a treat every time. Once you've got him excited, walk three feet away from him and say "SPOT, COME!!!!" You may have to guide him to you on a leash at first, but most dogs catch on to this game very quickly. Repeat this exercise (from a few feet away) ten times. **IT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO GIVE HIM A TREAT EVERY SINGLE TIME HE COMES TO YOU; EVERY TIME YOU CALL HIM! DO NOT CALL HIM UNLESS YOU HAVE THE TREAT IN YOUR HANDS!**

Gradually, move farther away from him, repeating the exercise every time you widen the distance. You may have to wait a few minutes between exercises, as usually, by the third or fourth move, he's following you around eagerly waiting for the next free treat to come his way. Wait until he's distracted, and then call him to you. You will gradually expand this exercise to other rooms, call him when he's upstairs and you're downstairs, hide in the closet and let him find you, etc. Use other family members to call him back and forth between you, with only one person at a time calling him. Make it a game for him, make it fun and you'll find he's been brainwashed for life.

Do this exercise for a month, on a daily basis (of course as he gets better and better, you don't have to start with him right in front of you, you can call him from the other room, etc.) Just remember, in that first month, only call the dog if you have a treat or you'll undo all your good brainwashing work!

After the first month, you can gradually start cutting down on the treats, not giving him anything but praise every fourth time. Do this for a couple of weeks, then every third time for a couple of

weeks, then every second time for a couple of weeks, until he's only getting an occasional treat to keep it fresh in his mind.

### KEEPING YOUR DOG'S ATTENTION

The best way to keep your dog's attention during training sessions is to find his weak spot something that he simply cannot resist and use it as a tool. For a majority of dogs, this could be food, ranging from his regular kibble, to cheese, low fat hot dogs cut into tiny pieces, or I've even had some people use fruit loops, Cheetos, etc to keep their dog's attention. Use whatever works for your dog. For some dogs, the irresistible may be a favourite toy, or simple praise, it's up to you to find what his weak spot is, by trying anything and everything. It's important to be consistent, when you ask him if he wants a treat, give it to him when he does the desired behaviour, do not use it to tease him with. Let him know that if he behaves he will be rewarded.

### STAY

An excellent way to get your dog to stay off lead is to use three or four different ties out on him, attach them to stationary objects such as trees, etc" and tell him to stay. This way, if he tries to break the stay, you are not correcting him, he's correcting himself. Start by just telling him to stay, walk away from him and then return to him. Before you release him, unsnap the extra leads and praise him before you release him. Eventually, once he's given up the idea of taking off, have distractions for him, such as people walking by, people walking by with dogs, children running by, people making a noise, etc. Once his stay outside on a tie out is perfect, begin putting him on stays in the house, while you're doing the dishes, watching TV, etc. If he gets up from the stay, always quietly return him to the same spot he started from and give him the firm command "STAY", until he stays until released. Once he stays PRAISE PROFUSELY before you release him. You'll find that eventually when you tell him to stay, he doesn't even think of getting up until he's given the release command.

### POSSESSIVENESS AND JEALOUSY

Please see "taking back control from your dog", these methods will work to control these behaviours. TOO "IN YOUR FACE; DEMANDING"

If you have a schip who is constantly demanding your attention, and then squirming all over the place when you give it to him, this method may help. Remember, this also as part of the "control" thing, so the "Taking back control" section of this handout is to be applied as well as the following. You give attention to your dog, when YOU, the ALPHA feels like it. If your dog wants your attention, put him on a sit-stay, and pet him, play with him, whatever, until you are finished, and then say "enough" or whatever command you wish to use and cease the attention. If he's persistent, put him on a down stay or a sit stay at your feet. The idea is to NOT be trained by your dog to do what HE wants WHEN he wants, but the other way around.

If you've got a dog that squirms when you hold him, try turning him on his back and gently rubbing the belly. I've also found that rubbing the armpits is an especially effective spot to hit in order to calm the dog. Be persistent, if he squirms around, gently place him on his back again, and continue rubbing, until he relaxes. When YOU are done, place him on the ground, and tell him "GOOD DOG THAT'S ENOUGH", or whatever release you decide to use, and let him go. This teaches the dog that YOU are in control of when and where he gets affection.

### EXCESSIVE BARKING

The best way to control excessive barking is to never let it get started to begin with. Let your dog know that a short, warning bark at a strange noise or visitor is all you want from him, and tell him, "OKAY, ENOUGH" or whatever you use to stop the barking. If he persists, give him a squirt in the face and say "ENOUGH" in a firm voice, until he stops. Another effective method is the can with pennies (originally known as the "throw chain" method). If your dog is barking and won't quiet

when you tell him, take a can that has pebbles or pennies in it (just enough to make a loud rattling noise) and toss it near the dog to distract him. When he is distracted by the noise, immediately call him to you and praise him. This way, instead of correcting him for a bad behaviour, you are distracting him and rewarding him for good behaviour. For indoors, you can place the can in a tube sock or place several of these cans in a pillowcase. This way, they make a lot of noise, but shouldn't damage anything.

**BARKING WHILE YOU'RE NOT AT HOME** If you have dogs that bark when you're not at home, give them a "job" to do while you're away. The Buster Cube, filled with kibble, is a wonderful job for him. One of my favourite "alone" activities is to take a Kong toy (hard rubber toys of various shapes that have a "hole" in the centre), stuff the hole with some sort of "pate" consistency treat (such as canned dog food, not chunky). You can also mix kibble in with the canned food for more fun. Freeze the entire thing, and give it to your dog a few minutes before you're going to leave. This usually keeps even a schip occupied for hours! Also like the infamous bully stick works well. Remember; do not let your dog always have free access to all his toys all the time. By dealing them out, one or two at a time, it keeps his interest in the toy a lot better, and aids in keeping your dog occupied with other things beside barking and other destructive behaviour when you're gone. Another thing that helps is to leave the T.V. or radio on so that there is a comforting background noise to soothe him and mask other strange noises that may cause him to bark.

I am also not above asking a friendly neighbour to either allow me access to their backyard, (after I pretend to the dog to leave), or to ask the neighbour themselves to do this exercise when I'm not at home to do so. Squirt a hose over the fence toward the dog, not to hit the dog, but to distract the dog, very time they bark unnecessarily. You shouldn't say anything, just every time the dog starts barking squirt water in the direction of the dog, over his head, or hitting near him, so that he will know that something lands on him when he barks. It is VERY important that the dog can't see the person do this (this way he thinks that his barking is causing this strange occurrence). This type of correction (similar to the proper use of the throw chain and can method), is a "self correction". The reason these methods of correction work so well, is that you don't need to be there to "give the command" to stop! The dog learns that when he exhibits an undesirable behaviour, something unpleasant happens, and when he stops, the "correction" stops. The "magic" waterworks method, works like a charm, but you've got to make sure this is a NICE neighbour, and not one who will tease the dog with this little training technique.

## IN CLOSING

The purpose of this section to attempt to address basic issues and questions that have most often been sent me over the years. I will be happy to help you as much as I possibly can with individual problems. If another question should arise (and you know it will, after all, we DO have Schipperkes) send your question to me, with permission to "cross post", and reprint, so that I can share interesting questions and topics with other Schip slaves, and others will benefit from your question. Remember, there is no such thing as a stupid question, and if you can prevent a bad behaviour from turning into a chronic behaviour, by stopping it before it becomes a habit, you're way ahead of the game.

## RASPBERRY & APPLE SLICE

Serves 8

4 green eating apples, peeled, cored and roughly chopped  
75g caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling  
150g unsalted butter, melted, plus extra for greasing  
1 medium egg, beaten  
300g self-raising flour, sifted  
125g fresh or frozen raspberries, plus extra to decorate  
Milk, for brushing

1 Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/Gas 4.

Place the apples and 2tbsp of cold water into a pan. Cover and cook over a low heat for 15 minutes. Drain off any excess liquid, stir in 1tbsp of the caster sugar, then set aside to cool.

2 For the pastry place the butter in a large bowl and whisk in the egg and remaining sugar. Stir in the flour to form a dough consistency. Shape into a ball and cut in half.

3 Wrap half the dough in cling-film and chill. Grease an 18cm x 28cm tray bake tin and press the remaining dough over the base in an even layer. Chill for 20 minutes.

4 Spread the apple mixture over the chilled base, leaving a 1cm border. Scatter over the raspberries.

5 Roll remaining dough out between 2 sheets of greaseproof paper to form a 20cm x 30cm rectangle. Remove the top sheet of the greaseproof paper and flip the dough over the fruit to cover. Remove the rest of the paper & press down the edges to seal. Brush with milk and sprinkle with sugar.

6 Bake for 25-30 minutes, until golden. Decorate with raspberries



## EASIEST-EVER ROAST CHICKEN

Serves 4

900g small new potatoes, scrubbed & halved  
500g small carrots, halved lengthways  
2 parsnips, quartered  
2tbsp vegetable or olive oil  
4 rashers of streaky bacon  
4 chicken legs  
4 sprigs each of fresh rosemary & thyme  
1 courgette, sliced  
Salt & black pepper  
6 heaped tsp chicken gravy granules

1 Pre-heat the oven to 200°C/fan 180°C/Gas 6.

2 Put potatoes into a large roasting pan with carrots & parsnips. Add oil & toss to coat. Roast for 10 minutes.

3 Meanwhile, wrap a rasher of bacon around each chicken leg, tucking a sprig of rosemary & thyme into each one. Arrange on top of vegetables & add courgette. Season with salt and pepper and roast for a further 35-40 minutes!

4 Just before serving, sprinkle gravy granules into a jug, add 450ml of boiling water & stir until thickened & smooth.

5 Serve gravy with chicken and vegetables!
