Secretary's Half Yearly Report

I do hope you all enjoyed yours summer vacation and now we look forward to the festive season.

After scheduling the Puppy Parade in March at the Open Show the committee have now decided to add a Puppy Parade (with K.C. permission) to our open show's in March, this is a parade of puppies 4 to 6 months old that will help puppies get used to being in the middle of our breed ring. Rosettes available for all puppies in the parade.

Health - The MPSIIIB Open Register is up and running on the club web site and you are invited to send copy's of your dogs test certificates to Ian Millar the Schipperke Health Co-ordinator so that your dogs results can be placed on the Club Register.

The Kennel Club now has it as a recommendation that all Kennel Club Assured Breeders Scheme Members should test their dogs or have proof of them being clear by descent.

If you forward to the Kennel Club your dogs original registration certificate and copy MPSIIIB test certificate they will return to you a new certificate free of charge with the status of your dogs MPSIIIB result.

Watch this space reference the "by descent" offspring.

Once again the Kennel Club has said that the Schipperke will loose two more sets of CC's in 2016 so we will now just have to wait and see which shows this applies to. I will expand on this at our AGM end of year report.

Richmond held a Judges Development Program for the Schipperke in April where another three candidates passed the exam. I wish to thank all those that gave up a day to travel to the Kennel Club Building at Stoneleigh to bring their dogs and thanks to Ian Millar who travelled from Scotland to give an excellent talk on the breed standard for which he received praise from Richmond Dog Show who manage this event.

The Schipperke Club Breed Open Show 31st March 2013

My thanks to the Schipperke Club for extending this invitation to Judge their Club Show, which I enjoyed immensely. Quality was mixed and variable but I was very well pleased with my winners.

Temperaments were excellent, but I was disappointed with the standard of handling. Fronts are a regular problem, and if you don't get this right the dog has no chance of moving correctly, however I did find a few who moved correctly and that was very pleasing to watch.

Minor Puppy Dog (1abs) Puppy Dog (0)

Junior Dog (1)

1. Mances Schipdale Byron, gold, cobby and typical with masculine head, good eye and expression, ok for bone and has good feet, would like a slightly longer rib, but he had a level topline and moved smartly.

Special Yearling Dog (2)

- 1 Philpott Aradet Expert Timing, black, 23 months and full for himself, quality all through, typical in outline with correct head and expression, well off for bone and has good feet, strong level back with a correct rib, very sound and stylish on the move.
- 2 Manners Roopec Diamond Black, black, with a typical outline but not a good in head as1

Post Graduate Dog (1,1abs)

1 Muggletons Mywulf Flame of Arnor, cream who was not at all happy with his surrounding and really didn't want to move.

Limit Dog (5)

Rather difficult class all shapes and sizes.

- 1 Robjohns Qwontox Quincy, black of quality and some style, so typical and in great coat, scored in head, neck and shoulder, with correct rear angles, moved soundly. Res Dog
- 2 Holmes Schipdale Dickens for Dencas, black with a good typical outline, but he is a bit immature at present, moved soundly
- 3 Manners Komargo's Crazy Diamond at Roopec, black, full bodied with attractive head shape and expression, could have done with a little less weight, however a very sound dog.

Open Dog (1,1abs)

1 Fludder's Aradet Shot in the Dark, black, stood alone but this did not detract from his quality and soundness. He's a proper Schipperke, cobby, masculine, with the correct head shape, correct eye shape and well placed ears, good expression. Deep rib of correct length, strong loin and well rounded rump, in good coat, very sound on the move, feet could have been improved. Best Dog

- 1 Tricklebanks Ch Nocte Boris Karloff, black, so fit and full of vitality, couldn't quite believe his age of 12, so very sound on the move, compact cobby body, with correct head and eye, correct rib and forchest. Neat feet. Best Vet Dog
- 2 Moss Bahram Beauregard, Black, another lovely dog of 11 years who is wearing remarkably well and has good typical conformation.

1. Lear Scales Best Junior Handler

Minor Puppy Bitch (2,1abs)

- 1 Deats Aradet Zeena, 6 months Black, what a show-stopper, oozes quality and breed type, so confident for such a baby, just right everywhere, loved her head from all angles, correctly made rib,legs well placed under her, she strutted her stuff up and down the ring like a veteran show dog, so sound and stylish, I wish I could have taken her home! Must have a very bright future. BPIS
- 2 Massey Carozza Black Lace at Ristine, 8 months black, with a good typical outline, scored in head and eye, sound little body and moved well, just a little bit leggy at present, but I am sure she will grow into them.

Puppy Bitch (1,1abs)

1 Massey Carozza Black Lace at Ristine,

Junior Bitch (3)

- 1 Hart & Hawkins Carozza Last Orders, Black, well made and typical with good breed type, feminine head with lovely shaped eye, good ears and neck, cobby body and level topline. Moved soundly
- 2 Hardy's Byquy Thyme at Palmosa, Quality black bitch with super outline, head, eye and expression, well off for bone and neat feet, good cobby body bith correct rib and level back and good rump, she could have won this class with a bit more confidence and movement training.
- 3 Leaf Chadbower Bonny Rye, Cream with good proportions and well muscled all through, lots to like about this girl, but she need more training in the show ring.

Special Yearing Bitch (5)

- 1 Thorne's Schipdale Bronte, black, quality all through, super outline, so typical of the breed, scores in head, eye, ears and neck, correct rib topline and rump, neat feet and very sound on the move
- 2 Hart & Hawkins Carozza Last Orders
- 3 Wearing Aradet Xotic Dancer, black, smaller than winner but a real little beauty, cobby with a grand sound little body. 3 Lovely bitches

Post Grad Bitch (5)

Difficult class as it seemed to be AV Schipp

- 1 Davis Byquy Eye Candy, black with good outline, cobby with pretty head
- 2 Muggleton Mywulf Dark Dragoness, black scored in head, neck and rib
- 3 Massey Scipsar Alice in Wonderland at Ristine , black Attractive head and eye, level topline

Limit Bitch (2)

- 1 Tricklebank Nocte Elvirra, black, scored in head, eye and ear, deep rib and strong level back with correct rump, in grand coat of correct texture, moved soundly
- 2 Leaf's Chadbower Bonny Rye

Open Bitch (3)

- 1 Forknall's Ch Avidore Hot Gossip , black, balanced and typical of good size and substance very feminine head with correct eye and well placed ears, sound level back and deep rib.
- 2 Robjohns Qwontox Quintessential, black bigger than 1 but very attractive with a good body, rib and rump, moved soundly
- 3 Wilson's Trijem Upper Class, black, small cobby and very full of herself, sound little body but very erratic on the move.

AOC Open Bitch (2)

- 1 Allington's Ch Rexford Ice Maiden, cream of good colour and depth, I thought she was overweight which detracted from her overall outline.
- 2 Leaf's Chardbower Bonny Rye

Veteran Bitch under 10 years (2,1abs)

- 1 Wearings Aradet Party Politics, black 7 years old and so much to like about her, sound in every dept, in great coat of the correct texture, so well balanced with so much breed type and moved just as a Schipp should with a short brisk stride that was lovely to watch. Best Bitch, BIS & Best Vet
- 2 Robjohns Qwontox Celtic Quest, black, bit bigger all through but good outline with a deep rib and level back, sound on the move.

Veteran Bitch Over 10 Years (3,1abs)

Three quality bitches very difficult to separate as I loved all 3

- 1 Forknall's Komargo Appassionata at Avidore, Black, neat feminine head, great eye and expression, neat feet, deep rib level back, super rump, moved so soundly belying her years.
- 2 Forknall's Ch Avidore Detroit Miss, black, quality, and type stamped all over her, so feminine and typical of the best of the breed, another who can show the youngsters how to do it.
- 3 Tricklebank's Ch Carozza Magdalena, black, cobby and sound all through, lovely little girl who is a credit to her breed, and so sound, a trio of truly lovely ladies that must have given so much pleasure to their lucky owners over the years.

USE YOUR LOAF

We received a telephone call from Heidi Lawrence at the Kennel club asking if Percy, (Barham Beauregard), and I would like to go to Discover Dogs on the Saturday. Not being as green as I am cabbage looking before answering I had the sense to ask why? Heidi explained that she had seen Percy and I working our 'B' obedience round at Winchester earlier in the summer and she was organising the 'Use Your' Loaf' Obedience Competition in the Good Citizen ring at Discover Dogs. The idea of this was to show people that you didn't have to have a Collie in order to participate in competitive obedience. It would be a bit of fun and she already had a German Shepherd, a golden retriever, a Papillion and Percy would make four – so I agreed to go. Unfortunately the golden retriever was unable to go at the last minute and his place had to be taken by a border collie. We were all introduced by the compare, however when he got to Percy he asked the audience if anyone knew what breed of dog he was. Needless to say two people put their hands up with great gusto, but this was Peter

and Jenny who had left the Schipperke stand in order to watch I felt duty bound to own up – one little girl put her hand up and suggested he was a Chihuahua however, someone did eventually come up with right name.

During the last week we had to wear aprons – us not the dogs! The heelwork was in normal, slow and fast pace. Whilst doing normal pace on the steward's command you have to tell your dog to sit, take two paces to the right and put on an oven glove, return to your dog and carry on doing heelwork. Then on the steward's command you had to leave your dog in the stand and walk a left handed square around your dog, pick up a wooden spoon, return to your dog and carry on doing heelwork until told to stop by the steward. Then we did slow pace while they played the song 'Food Glorious Food!' You then had to do fast pace and every time the steward gave a command, i.e. right turn; you had to shout 'Yes Chef'. Well by the time we had finished Percy was sure I had totally lost my marbles and to honest so did I! Retrieve was a wooden spoon. We also had to do distance control – we had to leave our dogs 5 paces away and the dogs had to remain on the spot while we gave them commands to change their positions as instructed, i.e. from the stand to the down, from the down to the sit etc. This has always been Percy's party piece, unfortunately the microphone and the instructions were held in front of you face so the dog couldn't see your face, after two attempts and Percy not taking up the position I crouched down and he did them perfectly. The stays were different – we had to leave the dogs in the down, go to a table on the other side of the ring and find two pieces of cooking equipment. The items were all numbered underneath and we were all given two numbers and you had to find the items with your numbers on – ours was 11 and 12. We left the dogs in a sedate manner, but the competitive drive took over and

we started to run – the exercise finished when you got back to your dog with the two items. Percy thought running was more interesting than lying down, typical Schipperke, so he decided to come with us which meant that I had to return him to his spot before I could carry on – then more disaster I couldn't find no.12 – someone had put 21 on instead!!!!! The dogs then had to do a send away – this is where you have to send your dog away from you to a designated area and on your command the dog has to lie down and stay there until you call them up to the heelwork position. We had all practised this before hand, unfortunately the markers where in a dark corner of the ring and all the dogs struggled to see them. When you called them into heel you had to carry on walking while stirring an imaginary concoction in a mixing bowl! The onlookers cheering for the winner judged the competition and although they had two goes at this German Shepherd won on both occasions despite the tremendous efforts of Peter and Jenny! As promised it all had been great fun – we all got a free polo shirt and the dogs went home with a bag of goodies.

I must say I was very proud of Percy and as usual he met lots of people and was a very good ambassador for his breed, even if I do say myself and he is proof, if proof were needed, that, Schipperkes CAN do obedience, just ask Janice and Jenny! We've paved the way, why don't some of you now have a go? You never know you might enjoy it!

DEALING WITH A DIFFICULT SCHIPPERKE – PROBLEM SOLVING

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The following is meant to be a basic guideline to help aid you in specific problems you may be experiencing with your Schipperke. Each situation always varies and what works for one situation, might not be appropriate for another. These solutions are the BASIC solutions that will most often work for the majority of dogs. If they don't work on your dog, it may be time to try something else. Often, if you are having an ongoing problem that these basics don't seem to work on, it's time to contact a professional who can evaluate your individual situation in person, by observing both you and your dog in action. It is often impossible to do this over the phone, it is important sometimes to have a face-to-face meeting.

THE BASICS

PACK ORDER

One basic concept that it's important to understand before we start is "Pack order". Wolves, coyotes and other wild "canines" run in families known as packs. In each pack, there is a "pack leader" or "alpha dog". Usually the dominant male in the pack sees himself as the alpha but the true alpha is the true dominant female in the pack. Usually, these two dogs run the pack together, with the female often giving the appearance to the male that HE is the boss but of course, we all know better than this and often, when push comes to shove, the female will put the dominant male in his place, letting him know who is truly "the boss". These pack leaders give corrections and favours out as they see fit. They control the rest of the pack, when they eat and play, where they sleep etc. They always take the choicest food and the best sleeping spots for themselves, with the lesser pack members having to accept what's left over when alphas have had their fill. In your family, your dog must see all the humans, especially the children, as an alpha or pack leader, over him. We can accomplish this by always giving the humans control over the dogs, in EVERY situation.

A lot of dogs tend to see the children as their "pack" as their equals or even see themselves as alpha over the children. This is why it's important, under adult supervision, for the children to be involved in all the training, feeding, control and dominance over the dog. It is unacceptable behaviour for a dog to bite a child in his family, especially if it's unprovoked.

SO, let's first discuss control issues. If you have a dog who is showing aggression toward a child in your family, or any other family member, it is time to assert your "alpha-ness" over your dog, time to take back control. There are several things you

can do in order to let your dog see you are the one in control and it is very important to be consistent when doing these things.

TAKING CONTROL BACK FROM YOUR DOG

CONTROLLED FEEDING

NEVER free-feed a dog. This means, never put down a dish of food and leave it, for your dog to eat at his leisure, whenever he feels like it. YOU control when he eats and how much he eats. Most of the time, this means putting his dish down for a set amount of time, no more than 15 or 20 minutes and even if he hasn't finished eating all of his food in this allotted time, pick it up and put it away until the next meal.

VERY CONTROLLED FEEDING (for extreme cases of doggy dominance):

In extreme cases, you may need to take it a step further and feed your dog only by hand. This is the ultimate control. The best way to do this is to divide your dog's regular food (hopefully dry kibble) into a couple of feedings a day. Put the dry food in a bag or bum bag and make your dog "earn" his food by obeying commands you give him. These commands can be basic obedience commands, like sit, down, stay, come, etc. Each time the dog obeys a command you praise him and give him several pieces of kibble from your hand. Give him another command and repeat the process until all the food has gone. This is time consuming but it really helps the dog know that YOU are the boss and you and only you control when and what he eats. Have your children help you as it's especially important for the dog to see even the very small children in the family as their superiors. I have seen this method help in very extreme cases of aggression; it is a wonderful control method.

TAKE IT LEAVE IT (OFF) GAME

Along these same lines is the "TAKE IT/OFF" exercise. Here is how it works: Place several kibbles in one of your hands. In addition to the regular kibble, have one or two very small pieces of some "special" treat, such as a small piece of pepperoni, cheese or whatever your dog really loves.

Sit in a chair, with your dog sitting, facing you, about a foot away. Put both your hands behind your back and drop one kibble from the hand with the food, into the palm of your empty hand. Bring your hand in front, and place it, palm flat up, in front of your dog. If the dog tries to snatch the treat, quickly but gently, pinch his toes with your feet or tap his nose and say loudly "OFF"! While doing this, do NOT jerk your hand back, instead, it's the dog that should back off. Do this several times until the dog is no longer grabbing for the food. Then, once the dog is no longer grabbing for the food, offer it to him again, in the same manner, but this time tell the dog to "TAKE IT"! It may take a few tries to get the dog to accept the food, but when he does, praise him profusely, "GOOD DOG"!

Then, start the exercise over again, using the plain kibble, and repeat the process described above. Every third or fourth time, replace the plain kibble with one of the special treats; this helps to keep the dog's attention on the game.

Tone of the voice is very important in this and any other obedience exercise. It is very important for the "OFF" to be filled with authority, and it often helps if you can lower your voice when giving a "correction" type command like this one.

This method, which is called "TAKE IT OFF" game, can overflow into other areas. It can be applied to all sorts of things, such as when the dog is doing an unwanted behaviour, like chewing on something he shouldn't have, getting onto furniture uninvited, etc. If you've done your job, "OFF" should stop the dog from doing whatever behaviour you wish to stop instantly.

OTHER METHODS OF CONTROL

Along these same lines, you can also control games, toys and coming into and going outside the house.

TOY/GAME CONTROL

Do not leave all the dog's toys laying around to play with at his own discretion. Put all the toys up, and YOU give him the toy you want him to have, when YOU want him to have it. When you play retrieval games with the dog, do NOT play tug of war. If you throw a toy for the dog to retrieve, when he comes back with it, he must release it to you without a struggle. You can trade a treat for the toy, allowing him to take the treat, upon releasing the article to you, and at the same time, giving him which ever command you decide on, such as "GIVE", "RELEASE", etc. When giving the dog any command, it is important to use only one word commands, as it's easier for the dog to understand a simple command rather than a chain of words.

ENTERING/EXITING CONTROL

When you and your dog are entering or exiting the house, it is important for you to have control over when he goes in and out. The best way to do this is to make the dog wait for YOU to enter/exit first. You can do this by telling him "WAIT", then upon your command of "OKAY" or whatever you decide to use to release him from the "WAIT" command simply means to stand there until he's released. The exercise also leads to boundary control methods, which I will discuss later in more detail.

ALPHA DOG SLEEPING ARRANGEMENTS

Another common thread I often find with a very dominant dog is that the dog is being allowed to sleep on the owner's bed with them. This tells the dog in doggy alpha language that he is your equal in the pack. Remember, the pack leaders ALWAYS take the best spot for themselves, leaving the rest of the pack to accept second best. One of the fastest ways to take back control of this situation is to best case, have the dog sleep in his own crate and not allow him to share your sleeping quarters with you. If you are totally opposed to crating, at the very least, give the dog a bed away from your bed, where he sleeps in his own spot.

BOUNDARY TRAINING

Boundary training is used to stop your dog from dashing out an open door or gate without your permission. It is to be used as a tool, but remember, NEVER trust any Schipperke off leash; they are too smart and too curious to ever be 100% trustworthy.

DOOR/GATE BOUNDARIES

The object of this exercise is to discourage your dog from dashing out of the front door every time he sees an opening. It is VERY effective with most dogs, but you must be consistent with it, and if you see him backsliding, start him fresh, like he's doing the exercise from the beginning. What this exercise accomplishes is to make the dog fear the door itself, unless he's invited to walk through it.

Start with your dog on a leash, with someone else holding him by the door. The person's job is only to act as insurance in case you are not fast enough with the door, but the assistant should not speak or give the dog a command or correction. WITHOUT SAYING ANYTHING, NO COMMANDS, open the door invitingly. As the dog begins to dash through the opening, slam the door right in the dog's face, once again, not saying anything. This works best with a screen door, as they're not very heavy, but they make a lot of noise when slammed. The longer you can wait before slamming the door, the better. The closer the dog comes to getting his nose in the door as it slams (without, of course actually doing so) the better. Rarely will a dog try the mad dash more than two or three times, and many dogs learn this little exercise in one try. Once he does not approach the door on a leash, have your assistant take him off the leash and repeat the exercise. Have the assistant stand behind you to catch him in case the lesson hasn't sunk in all the way. This is one of the most effective, instant gratification training tools I've ever learned, you will be shocked to see how well it works!

The same method can be applied to an outside gate. Once again, start with the assistant holding the dog on a leash, once the dog is no longer dashing through the open gate, remove the leash, but make sure you have a backup person to catch the dog in case he hasn't learned his lesson.

We may not have gone to America ourselves but if we use our imaginations when reading this article we could well, be there.




