How have you fared with the weather this summer? I was holidaying in Builth Wells prior to the WKC CH Show. It was 35 degrees for some days, I can't ever remember Wales being so hot! We spent those days keeping the dogs cool, early morning and late night walks and in-between they had sun screens, fans and 'cool' coats that were regularly watered. We are over half way through the year and appear to be back to normal certainly with CH Shows. Brachyury (Bob Tail Gene/Short Tail)

Bob Tail in dogs is a genetic mutation **(BT)** affecting the length of the tail. The length of tail can range from a slightly shorter tail than normal, through various lengths to a complete lack of vertebrae (tailless).

It is caused by the **Brachyury** mutation **(BT)** and inheritance of this trait is autosomal dominant. This means that one copy of the mutation **(BT)** is enough to cause the natural short tail.

(N)/(N) Mating

The mating of a natural tail **(N)** to a natural tail **(N)** will not have the natural bob tail gene. They should produce puppies with normal tails however other genetic factors could affect tail length. They cannot pass the natural bobtail mutated gene to their offspring.

(N)/(BT) Mating

The mating of a natural tail dog **(N)** to a bob tail dog **(BT)** will see the **(BT)** mutation passed on in 50% of puppies produced and bob tails seen, 25% **(N)** normal tails and 25% puppies with the embryonic lethal **(BT/BT)** mutation (an expected 25% reduction in litter size).

(BT/BT) Mating

No dogs with two copies of the mutation **(BT/BT)** have been found. It is thought that embryos with two copies of the mutation **(BT/BT)** either, die in the womb and are reabsorbed by the bitch resulting in smaller litters, or die shortly after birth.

It is strongly suggested that the mating of a bob tail (BT) to a bob tail (BT) should not be attempted as this is lethal to the embryo's which leads to death of the puppies during development in the womb. If a puppy should be born it will suffer severe development deformities including spinal deformities leading to death shortly after birth.

By testing for the bob tail **(BT)** mutation it is hoped that any **(BT)/(BT)** matings can be avoided. It will also show if a dog is Docked or a Natural Bob Tail also eliminating the possibility of a **(BT/BT)** mating occurring.

Few breeds are lucky enough to have a photograph of the very first dog to start the breed off, but we were fortunate enough to find a picture of Flo (sometimes Flo of Antwerp or Qui Vive) courtesy of Dawn Banister in the US. Many readers will have seen the image of Flo, the first recorded import in 1887, depicted with other exhibits at the first show she attended at Crystal Palace in 1887, were she featured prominently among the winners.

Now, Dawn has unearthed a second illustration from the same event, another sketch which appeared in a collage from the show in the illustrated London News of December 1887. This only shows a headstudy of Flo but is much more flattering and displays basic characteristics which we would still value to-day. A fascinating look back to the start of it all.



Coloured Schipperkes

While there is little doubt that the prevalent colour to be found in our breed is a dense, solid black, other self-colours have always been present from the very early days when the breed first began to emerge and stabilise in its native Belgium. To-day, we have a good quantity of non-black specimens in our show-rings and we have a very respectable number of title-holders too, most a shade of cream, fawn or gold.

Non-blacks have often appeared to get the thin edge of the wedge, however, and i can certainly recall at least one successful breeder of the 60s and 70s telling me that the only place for a non-black puppy was the bucket! This attitude seems to have had its roots in the breed's earliest days when there was no real understanding of genetics and, in fact, Gregor Mendel, regarded as the father of genetics, had only published his initial findings a few years before schips were first recognised as a breed. Early Belgian fanciers were adamant that the only "true" colour was black. Even a few white hairs were regarded as evidence of impure blood and many early aficionados expected that a schip's mouth should show black pigment too, proof positive that the dog was a genuine example of the breed!

If you look at Dr Freeman's first book on the breed, published in 1907, there is mention of coloured dogs and there is a detailed record of a club meeting in 1891, when Mr W. Temple proposed that coloured specimens, specifically chocolates, should be recognised. In their recent book, "the historical schipperke vol. 2, (the schipperke in Great Britain"), Dawn and Craig Bannister, provide many clues to the prevalence of chocolates in the early days in the UK. Nevertheless, it appears that the matter of non-blacks was "settled" after the 1891 meeting and in 1892, the club issued a statement saying, "in future, no chocolate coloured schipperke will be recognised by the club and no club judges can award prizes to any chocolate-coloured schipperkes <u>even if classes or prizes are provided for them"</u> (my underlining). Freeman goes on to say that "<u>nothing more</u> (my underlining again) was heard of classes for any other colour than black for a long time and it is difficult to see how any club adopting the standard of their native country can encourage schipperkes of a colour not recognised in the land of their origin". E.B. Holmes in his 1934 book on the breed refers to the Temple proposal in passing and in "the schipperke" by Ewart Smith (1981) it is reported more fully once more. Holmes also mentions that the Northern Club, on which our current club is based, attempted to re-popularise the breed after the first war and as part of that strategy, provided classes for coloureds from 1920 and also altered its standard to read that "coloured coats are recognised by the Northern Schipperke Club to be self-coloured and harsh". Mr Holmes was not optimistic and, indeed, the initiative was not particularly successful.

Although I knew that they had not disappeared entirely, I was very much of the belief that coloureds had more or less slipped off the radar for years after 1891/2. Schipperkes were black from then on in and it was only a long time later that our standard was amended to read "black but other whole colours permissible" - not so at all!!

Dawn Bannister has continued an exhaustive research of this topic and has unearthed a number of extracts from general periodicals and the canine press of the time which clearly show that coloured schips, including chocolates, continued to appear frequently at shows over the years, were owned by prominent breeders and club members of the time and even had classes scheduled for them regularly, even at breed shows held by the St Hubert Club (founded 1894). And all this despite the 1892 club statement and the fact that all three clubs in existence then had adopted the breed standard of the first Belgian club which stated unequivocally that the breed was "black".

I offer a sample of these press extracts below for your interest and interpretation. All are from "The Queen", a society magazine which carried a column on dogs and dog shows. None of the shows is named.

1. "On more than one occasion, attention has been called in this column to the neglect of schipperkes that are not black in colour. Although in Holland black is the prevailing hue, there are others, chocolate or brown, pale fawn and almost white, whilst fawn and white specimens are obtainable. In this country, there have been several almost white specimens shown and chocolates are likewise known here. Thus it is pleasant to find the various colours are to be appreciated, and the St Hubert Schipperke Club is providing classes for specimens other than black at the forthcoming toy show at the Crystal Palace. The perky little "skip" quite as much deserves to be a dog of many colours as the Pomeranian, which he resembles in many particulars". (1906)

2. "Mrs Crosfield and Mrs A. Kindell were mostly to the fore with their funny little schipperkes, Prestwich Joe and Satanita and Miss Lupton honoured our cricketing Indian prince" Ranji" by calling a little black dog after him. There were some novelties in this group in the form of a chocolate or brown schipperke, shown by Mrs Moseley, and one white and two pale fawn coloured specimens; very pretty indeed, especially the white one, sent by Miss M. Durrant, and all these colours are especially worth cultivating – at any rate, they are handsomer than the black dogs." (1906)

(n.b. the Moseleys and the Durrants were prominent exhibitors in the early years, Mr Durrant being a founder member of the first club).



3. "Schipperkes contained nothing particularly remarkable and the class for those other than black attracted only three or four chocolates and one pretty pale fawn, Miss L Lupton's Rufus, that won, her chocolate, Charmer, being second and Mrs G. Rugg's Freda, third. In the ordinary classes, the chief winners were Mrs Patrick's Percy (champion dog), Mr G.J. Ross' Firwood Fauntleroi, Dr Freeman's Benedetta (champion bitch) and Mr Ross' Firwood Faith."

(n.b. so at least 5 dogs in the coloured class).

4. "With all the literature and the specialist clubs and newspapers, it is surprising that so much ignorance still exists regarding dogs in general. There is a little dog called the schipperke which is usually seen of a black colour and devoid of a tail. It enjoys a certain amount of popularity and may be taken as the connecting link between the Pomeranian and the terrier. Originally it is understood to have come from Belgium, where it was a favourite with the bargees, who kept it in their boats as a guard and to kill rats. Although the general colour of the schipperke is black, there are chocolate-coloured specimens, as well as others white or fawn in hue. Indeed, special classes are frequently provided for the other than black dogs and the chocolate or liver ones, when bright and clean, are particularly handsome; as a fact, they deserve encouragement. Some little time ago, at a south of England show, the judge exhibited his good taste when he awarded a prize to a brown schipperke. This, however, did not please the owners of black specimens, one of whom went so far as to lodge a protest with the Kennel Club condemning the award, urging that the prize ought to have been given to a black specimen. No more frivolous complaint was ever made to the Kennel Club, who very properly refused to interfere with the decision, as the matter of colour rested entirely with the judge. It is quite pleasant to find one of these often much-abused officials with the spirit to move out of the old groove". (1906).

(n.b. "special classes are frequently provided". And then the old antagonism raises its head again).

5. "Mrs Deane Willis and Mrs Crosfield were successful in a good schipperke group, the little bargee dog of Holland having many admirers among lady exhibitors: and it is rather strange that so little is heard of the coloured schipperkes which Dr Freeman, Miss Lupton and other breeders tried to boom a few years ago."

(n.b. interesting to read in this 1907 offering that Dr Freeman was seen by the writer as a champion of the coloureds!!).

So, lots of tantalising clues and snippets to give us some impression of what went on concerning non-blacks in those early days around the breed's birth. What is clear, however, is that the club statement of 1892, issued after much passionate debate, was "honoured more in the breach than the observance". Coloureds did not go away, just as they have not gone away in the countries which currently only recognise blacks. They continued to be shown regardless and some of them won! Non-blacks are part of the breed's natural heritage and it seems only right that they should be celebrated for the richness and variety they bring.

The following is an extract from "Tom Tug and Others", sub-titled "Sketches in a domestic menagerie" published in 1898 by Mrs Dew-Smith. The papers in the book first appeared in the long-defunct "Pall Mall Gazette". Primary characters are Tom Tug the bulldog and his companion, Abel, the black schipperke. Some readers may be fortunate enough to own a copy of this rare book or at least to have seen other extracts in volumes such as Clifford ("doggie") Hubbard's "A Kennel of Dogs" published in 1977. It is a delight with enchanting illustrations by Elinor M. Monsell. This section deals with Abel's relationship with the gardener, Master Pitt.

"It was in the autumn, when the chestnut trees were strewing the paths with a thick carpet of brown leaves and still browner horse-chestnuts, that Abel fell in love with the individual, whom, in spite of his years (verging on fifty), we always address as "Master Pitt". Master Pitt was occupied at the time with broom and barrow in sweeping up the chestnuts and leaves and wheeling them away to a mound in the corner of the paddock.

The schipperke, wandering about the garden, suddenly found his interest roused by the shining brown balls that strewed the ground beneath the leaves. He bit one or two to pieces to see what they were made of, and then started a little game with them on his own account, throwing them up, running after them and searching for them among the leaves. by way of amusing him, Master Pitt now and then picked up a chestnut and threw it away into the shrubberies or out on to the lawn. This won Abel's heart. He then and there became Master Pitt's sworn ally and inseparable companion.

One needs to be a dog to understand the supreme joy of running after anything, or the possibilities of delight that exist in sticks and stones and balls. The amount of blissful emotion some dogs seem to extract from sticks and stones leads one to suspect them of being inarticulate poets. In some dogs, the mere sight of a stick or a stone seems to produce a poetic frenzy bordering on insanity.


With Abel, i believe, the emotion arises from a more elementary and primitive instinct, that of the pursuit of prey. The sight of something in rapid flight moves him to pursue. When he has caught the chestnut, the desire to annihilate it struggles for some moments with the wish to have it thrown again. He longs to pursue it again and yet he cannot bear to give it up. He rushes back with it and drops it at Master Pitt's feet, seizes it again, drops it and dashes at it again if Master Pitt attempts to touch it – and displays a charming vacillation before he can make up his mind to let Master Pitt pick it up and throw it again. If, however, Master Pitt shows no eagerness to throw the chestnut, he will worry him persistently until he does, dropping it at his feet, picking it up and dropping it again and drawing attention to it with his sharp little bark.

A familiar sight in the autumn was Master Pitt beneath the chestnut trees, broom in hand and wheelbarrow by his side, busily sweeping up the leaves, as if unconscious of all else and before him on the ground a little black schipperke, gazing at him with painful eagerness, his ears pricked and his whole body stiff with anticipation – every now and then making a dash forward to draw Master Pitt's attention to something at his feet and uttering little irrepressible squeaks that sounded as if they were escaping by accident from an India rubber bag full of sound.

"It's one of them old conquerors he wants", Master Pitt would say (alluding to the chestnuts) and taking one up he would throw it where the shrubs were thickest, adding "he'll hunt for it all the morning and not give up till he's found it".

When chestnuts began to run short, Master Pitt generally contrived to have a ball in his pocket to amuse his little friend. Balls and chestnuts are not the only bonds of union between Abel and Master Pitt, however. There are others whose grounds are less easily discernible. Master Pitt's pursuits have a fascination for the schipperke. He will follow him about for hours, watching him scrape the nice green tinge, that comes from sprouting moss and grass, from the garden paths and hoe up weeds. And he will sit all day watching him dig and plant vegetables in the kitchen-garden. In the cold weather, Master Pitt made him a little tent to shelter him from the wind while engaged in this sedative occupation. three sticks were driven into the ground to form a semi-circle. Master Pitt's coat was hung on them to make a screen and a bit of sacking was put on the ground for Abel to lie on. When the wind was cold, this little erection was always to be seen in the neighbourhood of Master Pitt's operations – Abel with ears pricked and paws crossed, mounting guard inside.

The corner of the paddock, which is Master Pitt's special domain, is also a most desirable haunt in Abel's eyes. There Master Pitt keeps the mounds which are his special pride, mounds of loam and soil, mounds of leaf manure and mounds that look like large brown puddings with wisps of straw sticking out and which contain potatoes, carrots, turnips and beetroots. There, too, he generally keeps a nice-smelling bonfire, on to which he piles weeds that fizz and shriek. There, too, the wheelbarrow is emptied of its contents and starts again for a new load. At a sign from Master Pitt, Abel leaps in to the empty barrow and has a ride back to the garden, which he very much enjoys. Possibly it stirs memories of the time when he was a little Belgian barge-dog and indeed there is something suggestive of a pilot in a boat in the way he stands in the "bows" of the barrow, with his fore-paws resting on the front and his eyes scanning the route."
